#### **Revaluation "Fair Share" Program Intro Notices Sent to Property Owners**

The Township's appointed Revaluation Firm, Professional Property Appraisers, Inc. (PPA) from Delran, NJ, have sent out a letter and a Q&A brochure regarding the implementation of the Township-wide Program to all property owners.

The Camden County Board of Taxation, in conjunction with State Regulations, ordered the Township to update all property values for the year 2010. The last Reval was done in 1993.

The State and County monitor all sales prices and compare the assessments of the properties that have sold. They determined that the current values are too outdated and inequities exist throughout the Township. Most other towns in the County are currently being revalued or will be in the next two years.

There are only a few firms certified by the State to perform Revaluations and it was important for the Township to obtain a very reputable company that knows the local values best.

The main objective of the Revaluation is to bring all assessments to market value as of October 1, 2009. The Revaluation, which is also called a "Tax Equalization Program", tries to spread the property tax burden "fairly" throughout the town, so everyone will pay their "fair share".

Township Assessor Chuck Palumbo oversees the Project. He saw the end of the 1977 Reval and supervised the 1993 Reval. "With the current economic situation and existing market conditions, it is to the town's (and taxpayer's) advantage to revalue with a more realistic market rather than the inflated and sub-prime mortgage market of the past few years," he said.

Palumbo noted the 1993 Reval, also done at the end of a market cycle, was successful on several fronts. The County and State reviewed the new assessments and sales prices at that time found they were nearly equal (100.34% ratio). Plus, some of the tax burden was shifted more to the commercial and industrial properties which were under-assessed at that time.

Only about 30% of the Township's properties saw tax increases due to the Reval in 1993. The other 70% had similar or lower taxes. Most of the increases or decreases were in the plus/minus \$600 range.

Palumbo feels there should be a similar situation this time around. Even though most assessments will at least double, the tax rate will be proportionately reduced. There are no new or additional tax dollars created by the Revaluation. The new assessments (total ratables) are applied to the budgets of the taxing districts (County, schools, municipal) to form the tax rate.

All of the Township's 22,000 properties will have an in-person visit during the next 6-7 months by certified appraisal inspectors from PPA. These inspectors have been registered with the GT Police Dept. and have official Twp ID. Property owners should check ID before letting them in. The inspectors will only be collecting data, such as the size of each structure and the amenities inside.

New valuations will not be available until final review sometime in October and notices will be sent out in mid-November. Property owners will have the opportunity to review their value with members of PPA next December. Further appeals can be made to the Assessor and County Board of Taxation.

PPA Reps are now sending out letters to various homeowner associations and other community groups to appear at their meetings and respond to any questions, if requested. PPA will also be setting up an office at the old Public Works building. The Township will be setting up a tab on the GT website, [www.glotwp.com](http://www.glotwp.com), with regular updates on the Reval and inspection information.

**ESTIMATED TAX BILLS TO BE SENT**

However, due to increased expenditures (mostly due to mandated or contractual obligations) and a decrease in State Aid - there will be an increase, needing a cap waiver approval from the State Local Finance Board. This may not happen until mid-January.

The Township will be sending out estimated Tax bills that will be due around February 1st. Another bill will be sent in April for final payment in May. Further information will be mailed with the tax bills.

2009 Rebate and other Tax Relief Info for Seniors will be coming out in late Jan. or early Feb., upon State confirmation of the programs. Assessor Chuck Palumbo will be visiting many Senior groups early in the year to present current info and answer any questions.

## **POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS**

### **CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY**

Attention community oriented citizens of Gloucester Township. The Gloucester Township Police Department, in a continuing effort to foster a better police-community partnership, would like to invite any Gloucester Township resident 21 years of age or older to attend the 7th Citizen's Police Academy free of charge.

The Gloucester Township Police Department Citizen's Police Academy will be a 10-week course that will take place on Thursdays starting in March 2009. The course will include an overview of the police department and the administration, uniformed patrol, police communications, special operations, criminal investigations, youth criminal law, and many other interesting topics.

If you feel you would like to be part of the cooperative effort between the police and the community, and would like to receive a Citizen's Police Academy application or have any questions, please call the Gloucester Township Crime Prevention Unit at 228-4011.

### **TRAFFIC SAFETY UNIT**

The operation of motorized scooters, mini bikes, trail bikes, go-peds and other similar motorized vehicles recreational devices, electric or gas powered, are prohibited by Gloucester Township Ordinance 82-1 from being operated:

- On private property without written consent of the property owner in their possession while operating the recreational device

- On any public, municipal, or board of education grounds or property

- On any public sidewalk or public street or area dedicated commonly used for pedestrians or vehicular traffic

- On any common area, parking area or open space of any apartment complex, multi family, residential, industrial complex or development

- In a manner to create loud, unnecessary or unusual noise so as to disturb or interfere with the peace and quiet of other persons and no person shall operate such unlicensed motor driven or motorized vehicle before 9:00 am within five hundred feet of any property line of any residential property line.

Violators may be charged in violation of L.O. 82-1 and New Jersey Motor vehicles laws, which also prohibit the use of these recreational vehicles on public roadways.

### **CRIME PREVENTION**

Attention Residents:

Due to some recent burglary activity in the area, we recommend the following steps to help reduce your chances of being a victim:

1. Remove all patio furniture from porches and patios in the off season, thus removing a tool used by burglars to get into your homes.
2. Remove ladders and other lawn and home tools from your yard and around your house and secure them in a garage or shed.
3. Make sure all doors and windows are secured in your vehicles and homes.
4. Leave a porch light on in front of your home.

By taking these steps you can reduce your chances of being a victim of a home or vehicle burglary.

### **BICYCLE/SKATEBOARD REGULATIONS**

In 2002 nearly 300,000 children were treated for bicycle related head injuries, and 134 children died from not wearing helmet.

New Jersey Law requires that all children under the age of 17 to wear a suitable helmet while riding a bicycle, roller-skating, or skate boarding. The helmet has to be properly fitted and fastened and meet the standards of the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) for Bicycle helmets.

### **CODE ENFORCEMENT**

It is the mission of the Code Enforcement Unit to work in partnership with the residents of Gloucester Township to promote and maintain a safe and desirable living environment. Code Enforcement helps improve the quality of life in our community. Some of the most common violations our investigators find while out on inspection are listed below:

Chapter 55 "Garbage, Rubbish and Waste": Trash may not be placed at the curb prior to 4:00 pm the day prior to pickup and trash containers must be remove within 12 hrs. This includes grass clipping as well. Also, when trimming trees and shrubs all brush/branches must be cut and bundled no longer than 5ft in length, not to exceed 50lbs and placed at the curb with your recycling.

Chapter 67A "Property Maintenance": Grass must be properly maintained during the growing season, grass may not exceed 10" in height (entire property: front, rear, side yards, gardens, and behind fences). Other property maintenance includes clearing trash/debris and maintenance on the dwelling itself (gutters, siding, soffits, peeling paint, windows/doors etc.)

We would also like to remind all residents of Gloucester Township about leaf collection. Leaves will be picked up on a seasonal basis. During that time leaves do not have to be



bagged, all leaves must be raked to the curb - Do not rake leaves into street if it will block traffic. In January 09, leaf pickup will end and all leaves must be bagged and placed at the curb on your scheduled recycling day.

## **RECYCLING INFO 2009**

All residents are reminded that recycling is the law, statewide, county, and locally. By removing recyclables from the regular trash flow, we help save our environment and save tax dollars that would otherwise be spent on trash disposal fees.

### **HOW TO RECYCLE**

All recyclables should be placed at curbside so that the collection crews can easily identify them on your BI-WEEKLY recycling day. The yellow, 20-gallon bucket

supplied by the Township is required for glass, metal and plastic recyclables. All containers should be empty and rinsed, loose caps or lids should be discarded. Please keep brush, leaves, and grass separate from these recyclables.

#### WHAT TO RECYCLE

**GLASS CONTAINERS** that were previously used for food or beverages. The containers may be clear, brown, or green glass, but do not include: auto glass, drinking glasses, window glass, mirrors, light bulbs, ceramics or any broken glass.

**METAL CONTAINERS** refers to aluminum, tin or bi-metal containers, do not include hangers, pots, pans or scrap metals.

**PLASTIC CONTAINERS** that display either a #1 or #2 inside the triangle-recycling emblem on the bottoms. These containers could have been used for juice, soda, water, milk and laundry detergent, but do not include: butter tubs, flower pots, anti freeze or oil containers, laundry buckets, plastic bags, plastic plates or utensils, syringes, vinyl and 5-gallon pails.

**RESIDENTIAL PAPER** refers to newspaper and all contents of the paper, including glossy paper inserts, catalogs, computer paper, envelopes, junk mail, magazines, office paper (including fax paper), text books (without hard covers), and work books. Also, all types of unwaxed/uncoated-corrugated cardboard are recyclable but it must be flattened to no larger than 3 feet by 2 feet, do not include: cardboard contaminated with food or grease (ex: No pizza boxes) and paper cups or plates. All residential paper should be put in a paper bag or tied with string (No plastic bags). Do not mix recyclable containers with your residential papers.

**BRUSH** must be cut into 4-foot lengths and tied into bundles not to exceed 50 pounds each. Brush will be collected during the week that includes a section's regular recycling day.

**STUMPS** are collected every 3-4 weeks: Residents are to notify the Public Works Department at 228-3144 prior to pick up.

**GRASS CLIPPINGS** will be collected on a WEEKLY for seven and a half months, from March 15 to October 31 (maximum of 20 bags per week) on the same day of week as your regular recycling day; and on your regular recycling day from November 1st to the end of the grass season. Clippings should be put in a trash container (maximum weight 40 pounds) or a trash bag and left untied.

**LEAVES** will be collected as follows: January 1 to March 14 - regular recycling day; March 15 to October 31 - weekly grass day (maximum of 20 bags per week); and November 1 to December 31 is the fall leaf schedule. Residents are reminded to rake their leaves to the curbside only during the fall leaf schedule.

**DIRT/SOD & GARDEN/LAWN DEBRIS** (mulch, pulled grass/weeds, plants, and twigs) must be in a separate bag or container from grass clippings and leaves. This collection is on regular recycling day.

#### WHEN TO RECYCLE

Check the schedule to determine your designated recycling dates. Recyclables will be collected every other week (except grass which is picked up weekly, from March 15 through October 31). Your trash and recyclables must be put out no earlier than 4:00 P.M. the day prior to collection, but no later than 5:00 A.M. on the collection day.

## OTHER RECYCLABLES

REFRIGERATORS, FREEZERS AND AIR CONDITIONERS are collected every Thursday. Residents are urged to call the Public Works Department in advance. Please remove refrigerator and freezer doors prior to leaving appliance at curbside. MOTOR OIL, CAR BATTERIES AND ANTI-FREEZE may be brought to the Public Works Department for recycling. However, other hazardous waste will not be accepted. Residents should call Camden County Hazardous Waste at 858-5241 for information. CONCRETE, BRICK OR RUBBLE may also be disposed of at the Public Works garage. Residents must show the office personnel proof of Township residency and job-site verification.

## RECYCLING CONTAINERS

New residents should pick-up a container at the Township Municipal Building, 228-4000 or Public Works Building, 228-3144. Residents that need additional containers may pick them up at the Township Municipal Building, 228-4000; cost is \$6.60  
Please Note: For containers that are left outside, residents are urged to drill (2) ¼” holes near the bottom to alleviate the problem of excess weight due to water or ice. Residents, please limit the weight of each container to 40 pounds.

## TRASH COLLECTION

Trash Collection will continue on the present schedule. Residents are urged to follow the same collection guidelines as before. If you have any questions, please call Republic Services, 234-4000. Tires, only two (2) tires per household with the metal rims removed, will be collected on your weekly trash day. Large metal household appliances, such as washing machines or stoves will be picked up at curbside on your weekly trash day. Sinks and Toilets will be picked up at curbside on your weekly trash day.
